# Mariposa Nature Tours trip report 12<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> April 2025

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## Introduction

This tour covered a range of sites including the Camargue, La Crau, and Les Alpilles in search of birds, butterflies, and more besides, taking in some of the best locations for spring wildlife in this south-eastern region of France.

Joining us for the tour were Mel & Ben, Ann, Veronica, and Victoria.

What follows is a daily diary for the week, followed by species list, and gallery.

# Day 1, 12<sup>th</sup> April



With the group arriving relatively early in the day we were at our beautiful hotel by mid- afternoon. Bags were soon dropped off, and we drove a short distance to spend the afternoon wandering through Les Alpilles. Under blue skies and in warm temperatures butterflies were much in evidence, and highlights included Baton Blue, Cleopatra, Green Hairstreak, and both Swallowtail and Scarce Swallowtail. Nightingales sang away whilst a pair of Bonelli's Eagles displayed overhead!

# Day 2, 13<sup>th</sup> April

We headed south today into the wetlands of the Camargue. Our first stop was the flooded areas at Mas d'Agon. As expected, there were birds everywhere! Greater Flamingos fed in the shallow waters whilst Whiskered and Gull-billed Terns hawked up and down. A small group of isolated bushes was home to a heronry and contained many Cattle Egrets but also Purple, Night and Squacco Herons.

The muddy margins were busy with large numbers (160!) of Arctic-bound Wood Sandpiper, and other wading birds included Temminck's Stint, Ruff, and Collared Pratincole. Several Purple Swamphen were spotted lurking on the reedy edge, and many Glossy Ibises flew back and forth low overhead



In the late morning we arrived at the small reserve at La Capeliere. Here we took a short stroll around the visitor trails. The sound of Nightingales was very evident with at least a dozen birds singing their hearts out and some of this typically furtive species even showing well.

Lunch was taken in the nature reserve car park under the watchful eye of the White Storks on their nests, with Great Reed and Grasshopper Warblers singing nearby.

We then took the road that leads to Plage de Piemanson, stopping at promising spots along the way. A brief stop at the Saltpan View Point gave us wonderful views of a pair of breeding Kentish Plover. Further on, the large salt pans held large numbers of Avocet, Greater Flamingo, and Slender-billed Gull. Scanning through the flocks of birds Caspian, Sandwich, and Little Terns were located. A short walk at the end

of road revealed a few migrant small birds including Northern Wheatear, Common Redstart, and good numbers of Yellow-type wagtails – Ashy-headed, Blue-headed and Yellow.

# Day 3, 14<sup>th</sup> April

This morning we headed out onto La Crau. We had a very pleasant stroll on this normally barren-looking area – with all the recent rain in the region, it looked more like a meadow. Large numbers of Cattle Egret greeted us, and it wasn't long before we located several Lesser Kestrel, Tawny Pipit, White Stork, Corn Bunting, and several Stone Curlew.





We lunched in Les

Alpilles under the pines before taking the track up to La Caume. With the sky brightening there were reasonable numbers of butterflies on the wing, and we had fabulous views of Provence Orange-tip, Baton Blue, Wall Brown, and Bath White. Singing Short-toed Treecreeper were heard but proved difficult to spot, but two Short-toed Eagles on the way back performed much better.

The trackside was good for flowers, and included Sombre Bee and Giant Orchids.

#### Day 4, 15<sup>th</sup> April

We headed back into the Camargue today, and started at the freshwater pools and reedbeds at Reserve du Scamandre. We spent the morning exploring the boardwalks and tracks with excellent numbers of flamingos and again masses of various herons - the large heronry here held Cattle, Great White and Little Egrets, and Purple, Grey and Night Herons – it was quite a sight. The shallow pool edges had good



numbers of Wood and Green Sandpiper, and plenty more elegant Black-winged Stilt.

We lunched at the reserve centre before heading down to the coast at Saintes Maries de la Mer. Driving the road north from Saintes Maries towards Consecaniere we stopped at



various saltpans and lagoons to enjoy the masses of stunning flamingos and other birds. Gull-billed Terns were roosting on a dry lagoon with Little Tern, Slenderbilled Gull, Wood Sandpiper, and yet more Blackwinged Stilts.

We parked up and enjoyed a lovely stroll between the lagoons with many (many) more flamingos and also quite a selection of small migrant birds passing

through. The latter included male Pied Flycatcher, Whinchat, Chiffchaff, an assortment of subspecies of Yellow Wagtail, and a stunning Woodchat Shrike.

# Day 5, 16<sup>th</sup> April

With completely calm weather we headed back out onto La Crau and spent the morning wandering around this remarkable place. The parking spot held several singing Nightingale, Green Woodpecker, and Fan-tailed Warbler. As we entered La Crau Tawny Pipits and Corn Buntings gave wonderful views. A Hebe Tiger moth was a pleasant surprise.



Small groups of male Little Bustards periodically would get up and fly but were always a wee bit distant, though we did managed to scope a couple on the ground.

Skylarks were singing everywhere, and other birds seen included

Stone Curlew, Short-toed Lark, Hoopoe, Southern Grey Shrike, and Lesser Kestrel. The latter breed in the sheep barns that are scattered across the plain.



With a bit of perseverance we eventually located a couple of singing Calandra Larks. These huge larks with striking dark underwings are a very rare breeding bird in France, and are only found here on La Crau.

As we headed back to the minibus a smart female Montagu's Harrier quartered across in front of us.

The afternoon was spent at the world heritage site of

Pont du Gard. This impressive Roman aqueduct held good numbers of Crag Martin, with one or two Alpine Swifts whizzing about for good measure. Both Common and Black Redstart were singing in the visitor areas, and a real surprise was a flock of 20 European Bee-eater over the car park as we were leaving.

# Day 6, 17<sup>th</sup> April

Our first stop this morning was at the picturesque hilltop town of Les Baux. We took the footpath below the cliffs, and in the sunshine enjoyed Crag Martin, Alpine Swift, Serin, and Sardinian Warblers. An early Western Marbled White butterfly was lovely to see, and we soon found a stunning pair of Blue Rock Thrush. We had a short time in the town exploring the narrow streets, and taking in the spectacular views.



We lunched at the start of the track at La Caume, and had a short walk, but the weather was cool and cloudy so we decided to head south and into the lowlands, and to Etang des Aulnes. Here we had a fabulous few hours pottering in the lakeside scrub with various



butterflies including Baton Blue, Dingy Skipper, and Green Hairstreak.

Flowers included countless Early Spider Orchids and Yellow Bee Orchids. Birds on the Etang included Caspian Tern, Little Gull, Great Reed Warbler in strident song, and hundreds of hirundines. A treat as we headed back to the mini-bus was a large flock (30+) of European Bee-eater feeding from wires along the track, even bashing the bees on the wires – what a sight!

# Day 7, 18<sup>th</sup> April

Today was unashamedly about butterflies. Our weather throughout the week had been mixed, and finally today's was forecast to be very fine. After an early breakfast we travelled east and into the neighbouring department of Var.



The morning was spent in a sheltered forest ride in glorious

sunshine. As a Nightingale blasted its song out we were delighted with over 30 species of stunning butterflies.

Highlights included Southern and Spanish Festoon, Provence Orange-tip, Cleopatra, Brimstone, Southern White Admiral, Nettle-tree Butterfly, and a Camberwell Beauty. One of the main targets was Provence Hairstreak, despite the name a very localised species in France – they kept us waiting, but we visited an old orchard area in the afternoon and were rewarded with at least four individuals. What a day!

# Day 8, 19<sup>th</sup> April

With everybody in the group having late afternoon flights home we were able to steal a few hours back in the Camargue. We visited Mas d'Agon again, and despite the gusty winds saw a lovely selection of birds. Highlights included Purple Swamphen, Red-crested Pochard, and yet more Wood Sandpiper. Two Black Terns were hawking with the Whiskered Terns, and it was great to be able to compare the two species.

We had a hassle-free journey back to Marseille airport, and everybody continued home without incident.
